Stories of Syria's Textiles: Art and Heritage across Two Millennia

Stories of Syria's Textiles: Art and Heritage across Two Millennia offers a fresh and compelling perspective on Syria's rich cultural heritage through its textile production from antiquity to the present. The exhibition features new scholarship and draws upon the knowledge of

Syrian silk producers, weavers, and other artisans. Twelve years after the conflict in Syria began in 2011, Stories of Syria's Textiles also underscores ongoing efforts to document, preserve, and revitalize Syrian textile heritage.

IN THE POLLACK FAMILY LEARNING CENTER Rhonda Khalifeh: Immortal Stitch

Experience a unique immersive environment and experiment with various textile arts activities in the Pollack Family Learning Center. Immortal Stitch grapples with shifting notions of identity and loss of place. Using a combination of repurposed Aghabani tablecloths and hand-dyed silk and wool, Rhonda Khalifeh's installation explores material heritage and her past and present relationship with Syrian craft. Khalifeh is a Syrian-American artist, dyer, and print designer based in New York.
